## Teaching Experience:

My regular teaching responsibilities at Connecticut include elementary Greek and intermediate Latin (on a rotating basis), a large lecture course in Roman Civilization offered each spring, a variety of small tutorial studies in advanced Latin and Greek texts (normally one or two each semester), and 200-level courses in translation (Ancient Fictions and Roman Historians, taught on a two-year rotation; I plan to add Hellenistic Judaism to this rotation in future).
